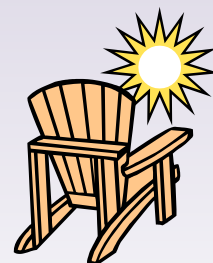

DIRECTOR'S DESK

A Note from the Director's Desk

Many of you may have noticed the recent changes to the Russell Pavilion Welcome Desk area. A new desk has been installed next to the fountain and coffee cart allowing security, employees and volunteers' greater visibility to our visitors and patients at Saint Joseph Hospital. With this change, all of the computers have been moved – including the computer touch screen for volunteers. This particular computer has been placed at the entrance to the new desk allowing volunteers easy access to clock in and out for their shifts. In the near future, the old round desk will be dismantled and new flooring installed.

This recent modification to the area is a preface into upcoming enhanced security measures to meet the individualized needs of our patients and their families. As mentioned last year, it was determined that a greater security presence was needed throughout the campus. Sometime this year, the following changes will occur:

- All visitors must register and receive a picture ID badge when entering the Hospital at the Welcome Desk (located at the Main Franklin entrance or the Russell Pavilion entrance).
- The Franklin Welcome Desk will be open for visiting hours, between 10pm – 5am; the Russell Pavilion Welcome Desk will be open 24 hours.
- Picture ID badges will be required for access to all floors of the Hospital.
- All visitors must check out and return their badge before leaving the Hospital.

What can you do to assist with the additional security measures at Saint Joseph Hospital? Be sure to have your ID badge and wear it at all times while on the Hospital campus. This will allow you to access entrance doors and other areas of the Hospital while expediting your entry for volunteer assignments.

How else can you help? ADDITIONAL VOLUNTEERS ARE NEEDED to assist at the Welcome Desks for various shifts throughout the day and evening. This coveted position will continue to increase in activity; so if you know of any friends or acquaintances that would enjoy an active volunteer position, please contact Leona or Jordan in the Volunteer office.

We will continue to keep the Volunteers informed with additional security changes at Saint Joseph Hospital. If you have any questions regarding these recent and upcoming changes, please contact us at anytime. ★

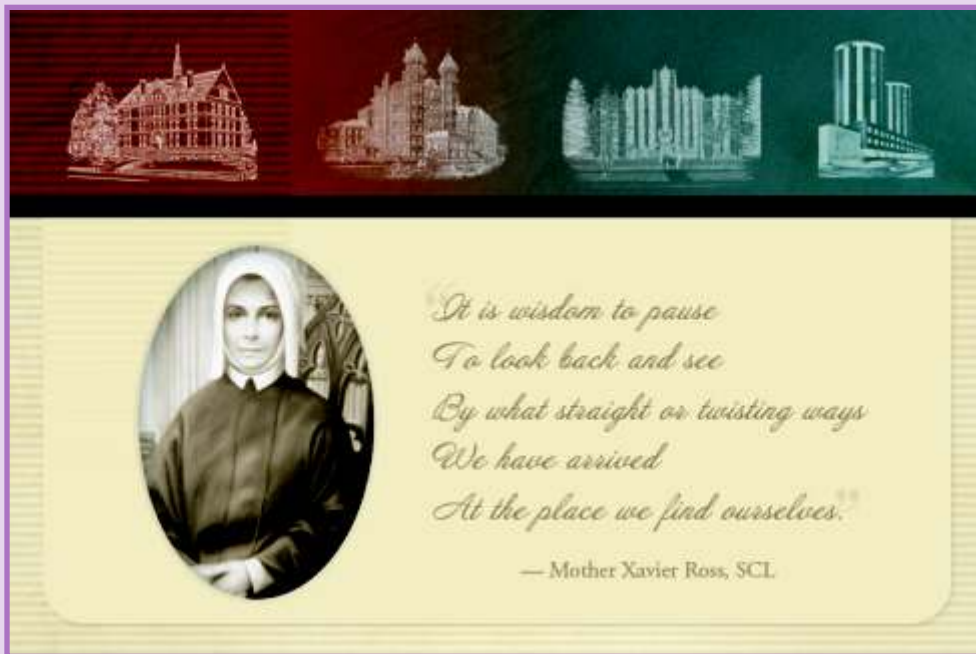

The Sisters of Charity of Leavenworth Celebrating 150th Jubilee

Significant milestones will be commemorated throughout 2008. The Sisters of Charity of Leavenworth Community is celebrating its 150th Jubilee. "From Founding to Future in Gratitude and Joy" is the theme for this year-long celebration. The Sisters of Charity established their community in Leavenworth, Kansas in 1858.

It was 135 years ago that the Sisters began caring for the sick and poor in Denver. On the morning of September 14, 1873, three Sisters arrived from Leavenworth to join Sister Joanna Bruner to open Saint Vincent's Hospital. During the next nine days they converted a tiny six-room brick house in the expanding rough and tumble town of Denver into a hospital. Most consider this to be the first private hospital in Colorado. The Bishop at the time "announced with pride that the Sisters of Charity are now ready to receive patients. It was made clear that patients of any nationality or creed would be welcomed." To commemorate the 150th anniversary of the Sisters and the 135th anniversary of Saint Joseph Hospital, a history wall has been installed along the main hallway leading to the Hospital's Sacred Heart Chapel. More than 30 colorful panels filled with stories and photos capture the Spirit of the Sisters through a century and a half of developing their Community and Saint Joseph Hospital. Next time you are at Saint Joseph Hospital, please take time to visit our history hallway.

In addition, the Sisters of Charity of Leavenworth Health System (SCLHS) has established a new web site: www.healingdenverhealthcare.org. The purpose of this web site is to educate the Denver community about Saint Joseph Hospital, SCLHS, and the sponsorship transaction for Exempla. The web site was introduced in an advertorial in the Sunday edition of The Denver Post. ★

GRANT AWARDS

SJHF Grant Awards

The Saint Joseph Hospital Foundation Volunteer Grants Committee approved the spring 2008 grants in the amount of \$50,455.50. The following grants were awarded at the Volunteer Appreciation Luncheon on April 30, 2008:

- The 3rd Floor Orthopedics Department received a grant for \$5,320.00 to purchase Vital Sign Monitors. This grant enables staff to accurately and safely check vital signs regularly on patients.
- The Blood Donor Center received a grant for \$7,037.00 to purchase updated beds to improve comfort for blood donor volunteers.
- The Surgery Department received a grant for \$17,300.00 to purchase a ViOptix Tissue Oximeter. This equipment will be used for free flap surgery and will prevent a patient from having to return after their surgery to remove dead tissue.
- The Medical Imaging Ultrasound Department received a grant for \$5,525.00 to purchase a blanket warmer. This warmer will be used to provide warmth and comfort to patients waiting in the Ultrasound and 3rd Floor CT Scan areas.
- The Blood Bank and Laboratory received a grant for \$5,273.50 to purchase cordless barcode scanners. These scanners will be used to assist in accurately tracking each donor's number and component code for each unit of blood they provide.
- The Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation Department received a grant for \$10,000.00 to purchase a Hoover Jack Air Patient Lift. This lift will assist staff in lifting a patient from the floor to a bed or a stretcher. ★

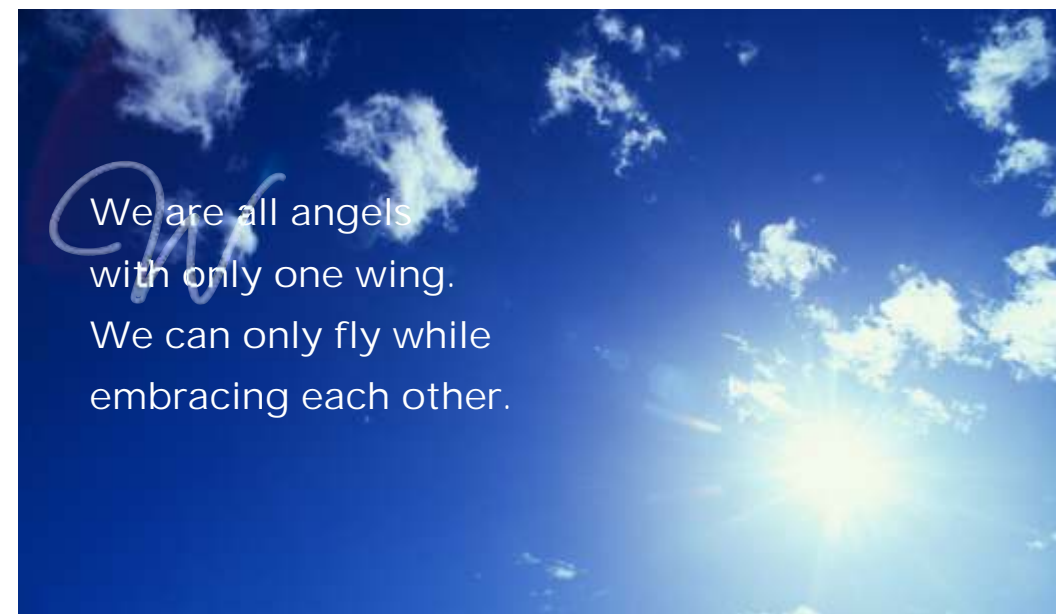
